With a new President comes a set of new regulatory priorities, including for rulemaking. This panel will discuss rulemaking in President Trump's administration, including what the new Administration might do regarding rules promulgated by President Obama's Administration and the prospects of proposed legislation.

Join our panel as we discuss these questions and more:

Ronald Levin is the William R. Orthwein Distinguished Professor of Law at the Washington University School of Law. He has testified before Congress on regulatory reform issues and has published numerous articles and book chapters on administrative law topics, including judicial review, rulemaking, and legislative reform of the regulatory process. He also has written about the law of lobbying and legislative ethics. Professor Levin has been active in the ABA Section of Administrative Law and Regulatory Practice for more than three decades and currently represents the Section in the ABA House of Delegates. He also is a public member of the Administrative Conference of the United States and currently chairs its Judicial Review Committee.

Sofie Miller is a Senior Policy Analyst at the George Washington University Regulatory Studies Center, where she analyzes the effects of federal regulations. Her research portfolio includes use of benefit-cost analysis by agencies, retrospective review of existing rules, economic analysis of energy efficiency standards, quantitative analysis of regulatory benefits, and the regressive effects of regulation. Sofie has drawn on this research to submit over twenty public comments to federal agencies. Sofie has published articles in academic journals of public policy and administrative law, and has testified before Congress on topics including regulatory reform and DOE's energy efficiency standards.

Anne Joseph O'Connell is George Johnson Professor of Law at the University of California, Berkeley. She has written on a number of topics, including political appointees, bureaucratic organization (and reorganization), agency decisions in emergencies, political changes in agency rulemaking, quasi-agencies, and congressional oversight of agencies. She is a two-time winner of the American Bar Association's Scholarship Award in Administrative Law for the best article or book published in the preceding year. Previously clerked for Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg and was a trial attorney for the Federal Programs Branch of the U.S. Department of Justice's Civil Division.

Adam White is a research fellow at the Hoover Institution, based in Washington, DC, writing on the courts and the administrative state. He currently co-chairs the ABA Section of Administrative Law and Regulatory Practice's Judicial Review Committee and co-directs its Supreme Court Series. He also is a member of the executive committee of the Federalist Society's Administrative Law & Regulation Practice Group. In addition to his commentary, Adam maintains an active litigation practice. He has recently completed a book on regulatory reform.
