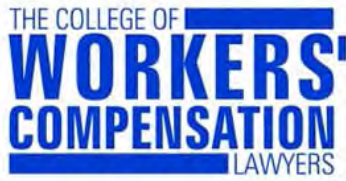

This panel will present and then critically analyze their picks of the most important case law developments, nationally, for 2017. Of course, workers' compensation systems are state statutory programs, and the direct effect of laws and case precedent outside of their state of origin is limited. Nevertheless, compensation principles and statutes have much in common among states and much can be learned from studying how legislatures and courts of other jurisdictions have treated similar issues. Notably, when state courts cannot adjudicate an issue based solely upon a statute's plain language and no precedent of the jurisdiction is determinative, they often consider authority from other states.
